
George Washington Carvers was an American agricultural scientist and inventor who promoted alternative crops to cotton and methods to prevent soil depletion.

George Washington Carver was born around 1865 into slavery in Diamond Grove, Missouri. His mother, sister and George (a week old) were kidnapped by night raiders. George's owners, Moses and Susan, were able to locate George and bargained with the kidnappers to get George back. Moses and Susan Carver raised George and his older brother, James, as their own. After slavery was abolished, "Aunt" Susan taught George to read. After several schools, he earned his high school diploma at Minneapolis High School in Minneapolis, Kansas. George received his

Bachelors and Masters degree from Iowa State University in 1896.

In 1896, Booker T. Washington, the first principal and president of Tuskegee Institute (now Tuskegee University), invited George to head its Agriculture Department. He taught there for 47 years. He taught methods of crop rotation and introduced several alternative cash crops for farmers that would improve the soil of areas heavily cultivated in cotton.

Through a long program of research, Carver would invent over 300 products derived from peanuts such as milk, flour, dyes, plastics, wood stains, soap, linoleum, oils and cosmetics. He also created 108 applications for sweet potatoes and 7 products made from pecans. George was one of the most prominent scientists of the early 20th century.

The purpose of this program is simple: to help you better understand your land. Soil testing provides valuable insight into the composition and nutrient levels of your soil, helping identify what it may need to improve overall health and productivity.

As highlighted by Amy Turner with OSU CFAES (September 3, 2025) in her article "Ohio State Helps Farmers Manage Impacts as Drought Conditions Spread Across Ohio," the drought conditions experience over the past two years have led to premature crop and leaf drop, shallow-rooted specialty crops, and dry, nutrient-deficient forage and pasture grounds.

The Ohio Soil and Water Conservation Commission will cause an election of Supervisors of the Perry County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) to be held in accordance with Chapter 940 of the Ohio Revised Code. Individuals who own or occupy land within the Perry County Soil and Water Conservation District and are 18 years of age or older may vote for Supervisor.
